## **Designing Pomo Baskets**





The Pomo people of Northern
California are well-known for
creating intricate basketry that is
admired around the world. Talented
artists create patterns by weaving
together plant material. You can see
how the material is woven together
in a coil shape in the photo to the
right. The patterns repeat around all
sides of the basket.





Feathered baskets, like the one to the left, are used for ceremonies and special occasions. They are often called 'sun baskets' for their bright colors and round shape.

The feathers come from birds native to the area, like mallard duck (green), meadowlark (yellow), oriole (orange), bluebird and blue jay (blue), and quail (brown).

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
STEP 1 - Can you finish the pattern on this Pomo Basket, below?
